Under 6s

Report of Under 6's 'joint training session'.

15 months after coming together as a team, Longwell Green Sports JFC U6s played their first match against another team (BOCO) on Saturday 24th November 2012.

Had we picked any other weekend in the last 15 months I'm quite sure that the weather would've been better than the weekend we had chosen! It was cold, wet and raining. A lot of areas around the whole country were experiencing floods. The Longwell Green pitches were unplayable due to being waterlogged so we opted for the all-weather surface at SBL.

The format for the game was 7-a-side and three lots of 15 minute periods. LG took the kick off and Lewis Hillier playing to Fraser Harper got the game underway. It took a few minutes for the teams to settle and the first 5 minutes were fairly evenly matched (and played mostly in the middle of the

pitch!). LG started to get their noses in front with Jack Shorland making the most of some good possession down the wing. Fraser and Joe Woodman were doing well in midfield and the game seemed to be played more in the BOCO half. BOCO defended resolutely and were always looking to counter attack. Several times they did break and they looked dangerous. But ultimately they were dealt with by the two defenders Ben Brown and Eddie Baker, backed up with some sound goal keeping by Robert Paget. After each BOCO break had been dealt with LG worked the ball back into the BOCO half. After a couple of substitutions that brought William Westbury and Maurice Doherty in to play LG were still looking solid. But late in the first period, after some good pressure from BOCO the LG defence were overrun, unable to deal with the BOCO attack and found themselves 1-0 down. LG not wanting to find themselves going into the first break behind, got the ball to Fraser Harper who made some space for himself with drop of the shoulder and unleashed a thunderbolt of a shot which beat everyone, only to see it crash off the far upright and out for a corner. LG weren't able to come up with anything from the corner and finished the period a goal down.

After a 5 minute interval, where substitutions were made, Ciaran Teagle and Henry Cox were brought into the game. Robert Paget was now out of goal and in midfield with Eddie Baker now taking the place between the sticks. The teams changed ends and BOCO took the kick off. LG were determined to get themselves back on terms and after only a few minutes of the 2nd period Fraser Harper made the most of some weak defending and crashed in the equaliser. LG's tails were now up as they went in search for some goals. BOCO however were settling nicely and were doing really well with keeping possession of the ball. It wasn't long before BOCO were back in front with a well worked goal from some nice build up play. The second period ended with 1-1 with the overall score 2-1 to BOCO.

Into the final period, with the game up for grabs and it all still to play for. Further substitutions for both teams having taken place. LG seemed a little disjointed from a complete change to the midfield. Joe Woodman now going in goal and Fraser Harper having to leave early due to another appointment with Manchester United at Old Trafford (get your hands off Fergie we saw him first!!!). BOCO capitalised on this and it wasn't long before a goal mouth scramble and the ball being poked goalwards, saw them 3-1 up. Saying that, if Sepp Blatter hadn't dithered for so long over the implementation of goal line technology, LG may have found themselves still only a goal behind. But the referee's decision is final and the goal was given. If heads had begun to drop then you wouldn't have blamed them. But LG were not giving up without a fight. They pressed forward in search of goals. And to be fair, the chances came. A shot on goal seemed to have done the trick until a stray hand from a defender stopped its path PENALTY??? No, the referee didn't see it. LG, not put off by this, carried on regardless and kept pressing forward. Ciaran Teagle went clear, had a one on one with the keeper and took his shot well, but the keeper was equal to it. Within a couple of minutes Ciaran got himself into another shooting position and this time he wasn't going to leave empty handed, having smashed the ball past the keeper giving him no chance. With the clock ticking away and LG now hungrier than ever for the equaliser, BOCO had to make do with defending. LG piled on more and more pressure in front of the BOCO goal. Another stray hand in the box again didn't result in a penalty and that was about it. LG just couldn't find the elusive third goal and BOCO came out eventual winners by 3 goals to 2.

In difficult conditions, and the result not perhaps how we would've liked, it was still a very enjoyable match. And that's what it's all about.


Finally, could I take this opportunity to wish you all a happy Christmas and roll on the New Year!!

Under 16s

Most of the under 16 boys have been members of Longwell Green since they started way back at under 5's and under 6's. They started life at Wick Fc juniors training in a field in Wick on Saturday mornings. They transferred to Longwell Green at under 6's age group under the guidance of Julian Harmer and various other parents and coaches. A few of our past players have gone on to play for academies but the majority are still here over ten years later.



Over the years the team have had mixed fortunes and results. They have won quite a few tournaments including our first Longwell Green tournament, DRG Stapleton and Fry Club. Also finishing runners up in tournaments including St. Nicholas and Thornbury. They also played in a week long tournament held by Sports Tours in Woolacombe, and finished runners up.

Starting competitive football in the A division in the Hanham minor league at under 9's and under 10's and division B at under 11's after a reshuffle to make leagues even numbers, the boys continued in the Avon Youth League in division 2 and have stayed there ever since. The boys narrowly missed out on promotion to division 1 at under 12 by 1 point. Under 13's was a tough year after the disappointment of missing out on promotion and they finished in the bottom half of the league but avoided relegation after an excellent few games at the end of the season. At under 14 and 15, the boys finished in the top half of the league in both years.

Final Thought

A recent article from the FA:

Parent's We Need You!

Does your son or daughter play for a team? If so, how do you support their learning and development? How can you aid their development?

I'm sure we have all witnessed the parent that shouts and screams all the way through their child's football match, trying to play the game for them with many instructions and groans when they make a mistake. The actions of the parents really do impact on the players game, learning and all round experience of 'their game'.

With the introduction of 'The Future Game' over 2 years ago now there is an emphasis on

improving the learning environments for players and also developing independent thinkers and decision makers. Players that learn to make their own way in their games instead of looking to the touchline for help.

So how can parents help?

Mistakes happen every day in all aspects of life but they are so important in the learning process. If a player repeats actions and skills it is likely a mistake won't be made. If a player is put in an environment where they are happy to try new skills and not afraid of making a mistake this is where they start to learn and reflect. Why didn't that skill work? What would I do differently next time? Instead of "well that didn't work and everyone moaned at me so I won't try that again".

Spotting these attempts and giving the players encouragement for trying something new is vital, regardless of the outcome.

At your son or daughters next game, stand back and let them play and if you want to shout try and make it positive, encourage them for their attempts. Remember .. A piano teacher wouldn't stand behind their student and shout 'black key, white key!'

Let them play .
